



Thinking ahead, what is our focus moving forward? For a start there is a Nationwide decline in show entries which is a concern for our local A and P shows and other Breed events. There are several reasons for this; show entry numbers haven't returned to what they were pre-covid, the cost of living has affected many, thinking twice about fuel costs in addition to entry fees which has also risen for many shows. This is very real for many of us. As wonderful as Shetland ponies are, I am sure no one is under any illusion that they are a significant revenue source.

I think if we can support our local area A and P Shows and Breed Events which run Registered Shetland Pony Breed, Ridden or Harness classes, this can make a difference. This support can look like entering and competing your ponies or by supporting with ring stewarding and volunteering.

NZSPBS AGM Area Representatives - Waikato/Upper North Island Report 2025

I wrote my first Area Report in 2012. The Shetland scene for this area has changed dramatically since then. In 2012 we had 7 area shows each season between Kumeu in the North and Waikato in the South. Our local Franklin shows often had upwards of 20 Shetlands competing. The Junior Handler classes alone had a dozen ponies or more. Fast forward to the 2024/25 season sees 4 shows and often classes of one pony per age group. During this time we have lost one major breeder, Gleneagles, and a few small breeders like Sunnymead, Whitinui and Whalsay. There has been a slow influx of ponies from the South Island in this time but more often than not they go into family homes as childrens ponies and don't appear in the showring, so it is easy to lose track of them. There has also been a steady decline in equestrian competitions across all disciplines over the past few years. A lot of local competitions are being cancelled last minute due to lack of entries. Very much a sign of the times where the discretionary dollar is being gobbled up on essential day to day living.

On a brighter note, I have recently been involved in rehoming a Shetland for a friend. He has found himself a lovely home with two wee girls aged 4 and 9. Burravoe Randolph hadn't been ridden for almost 5 years, but once a prospective buyer had been found, Ann popped him in the float (no issues there at all) and bought him to my place so that we could pop his new rider on in the security of my large round pen. Within minutes she was happily trotting him around off lead and he didn't put a foot wrong. What wonderful, honest, happy wee ponies these Shetlands are. We then delivered Randolph, with his full wardrobe and accessories (including his Christmas reindeer costume) to his new home. We explained that Shetlands come with full backup and we are always here to answer any queries or concerns.

All the best for a great AGM, and thanks to those who have put their hands up to keep steering the Society in the right direction.

NZSPBS AGM Area Representatives - Mid/Lower South Island Report 2025


Not a lot to report from our area, hope every ones Shetlands are well and that our winter is kind to us. Numbers have been down a bit and some shows have cut classes which doesn't help. Palmerston didn't put any on and when they did it was missing stallion and young stock classes. They have promised that next season they will be running full classes so will have to wait and see. Oamaru run their show like a have a go day, with very limited classes, so we said no to supporting them. There old secretary would have been ashamed as before she sadly passed away she ran three very well run shows down here.

We have supported these shows and they treat us terrible. If shows keep doing this then they will end up with no competitors, it costs a lot to enter and travel and giving first prize money only if there is less than three in the classes, it makes quite an expensive hobby. We were also accused at Palmerston of pinching the cups and trophies because they handed them out. We tried to tell the stewards that normally we only get our photo taken with them, but they said no you get to take them home. When we looked at the trophies they had not been engraved for quite a number of years which is a great shame, at least we got them updated. Such a shame when shows don't engrave them, if they won't let you take them home then at least engrave them for future generations to look back on them to see who was winning in past years. There is quite a good group of competitors in our region and the shows need to keep the encouragement going as without us there are no shows.

Our condolences go out to Margaret Rowe and family for their sad loss of Brian, a true Shetland pony competitor who will be sadly missed at the shows down here.

'Dolly's Calvacade Adventure' ~ Karen Wilson

Cavalcade 2025 - Twizel Here We Come!!!

The 32nd Cavalcade trotted into Twizel in late February 2025 – our first time making it there, thanks to Covid calling off our last attempt.

This was Dolly's 4th Cavalcade. Dolly is my 13 year old skewbald chestnut mare, Social Security #952. She's Lilly, (my first harness pony's) younger sibling.

Pateoroa 2020 was her first, which she completed flying solo. Millers Flat 2023 & Waikaia 2024, saw Lilly trotting back on the scene like she'd never left.

From here the pair ran a sibling time-share arrangement, alternating their positions and roles.

But this year things took a turn, Dolly somehow drew the short straw, assuming the energetic roll in front, while Lilly relegated herself to the more leisurely task at the rear as boss pack pony.

Also trotting along were Bell and Pearl in pairs with Andy in her 4 wheeler. Asterix returned for another campaign, towing Shona's wagon with Noble, on his first ever appearance, making his debut as a pack pony and last but not least trusty little Malcolm looked after Jean.

This year we camped at Glenlyon Station some 6 kilometres inland north of Twizel's township. We camped here for the whole duration which was quite a change from previous year's gypsy type movements.



First day saw us on a small 7 km excursion, around surrounding countryside, a mix of road verges and farmlands. It gave us time for everyone to become accustomed to each other - riders, carts/wagons noises etc.





We eased into the week with a cruisy 17km ride/drive- flat terrain, happy drivers/riders, well behaved ponies everyone finding their rhythm. Camp that night was peaceful. We all happily shuffled off to bed, dreaming of peace and quiet, and maybe a hot cuppa in the morning. Little did we know that two tiny Houdini's had other plans? Just as we were snuggled into our stretchers, visions of calm perfect little ponies dancing in our heads, the miniature masterminds launched their midnight escape mission.

Cue absolute pandemonium....



The Giddy-up girls, half dressed and half-asleep, leapt into action like a scene from a comedy caper. Float doors were flung open, campers were stumbling around in the dark, and one poor soul ended up taking an unplanned dip in the creek. Not to be outdone, two hefty Clydesdales decided to join the rebellion and galloped in like back-up reinforcements.

Moral of the story: never trust the calm before the storm... especially if the storm has four hooves and a cheeky glint in its eye.;-)





A "leisurely" 19 kilometre jaunt with a good pull to the Air strip helped to take some sting out of the ponies. Most of the journey took place on Ben Ohau Station. Lunchtime saw us enjoying the scenic view of Lake Pukaki. Our return journey followed a stream, a very *bumpy* ride, where every rut was a surprise core workout. The ponies handled it like champs, but some of our backsides weren't quite so forgiving.





Tuesday's mission was a 19km trip to a picnic spot by the canal near Lake Pukaki. It was a lovely day out, with my girls and Shona's boys. Unfortunately Andy had sustained a crack in a weld the day before so she had to sit this one out. Malcolm took a leave day so Jean rode with Trail Boss – Sarah, in her side by side vehicle. We road along narrow tracks, canal edges, and through farmland. At one point, we had to skirt the edge of a crop field with strict instructions: 'Stick to the paddock edge or else'. Safely navigated we headed up onto the canal top until we reached a picturesque spot for a well-earned rest.



Our route? The infamous Pyramid Track – a name that sounds deceptively scenic until you're halfway up questioning every life choice that lead you to this point. We started off innocently enough, crossing the canals with the ponies trotting along like 'This isn't so bad "then came the farmland. Endless paddocks stretched out before us, with sheep giving us that look that says, - "You poor fools have no idea what's coming."

Then came the forestry block. Trees shade, forest lined hills with the summit of the Pyramid track in our sights. Because next came **The Climb.**

Not just any climb – oh no. This was a **zig-zagging, gear-grinding, cart-creaking, sweat-induced slog** up the Pyramid Track.

Ponies leaned into it like Olympic Athletes. And just when we thought we got this.... A commotion broke out ahead. One group's carriage dramatically parted company with its horse and not in a romantic way. We could hear the commotion but couldn't see due to the tricky terrain. Some rogue gear decided today was the day it no longer wanted to do its job. Luckily, no one was harmed and after some quick repairs and a collective deep breath, we were back on track - ponies reattached and dignity mostly intact. As they say what goes up must come down – and we all came down quietly and in one piece breaking for lunch at the base of the trail.





Friday, wasn't your average drive either. We rendezvoused at Twizel School where a group of cheeky little rustlers held up our posse. Shots weren't fired, but we did hand over all our coins before heading out with these junior bandits for a joyride around the school. After that we rolled out towards Lake Ruataniwha under sunny skies – perfect for a long lazy lunch by the water. Our journey home followed much of the canals and at one point we could see the Dam Packhorse Trail silhouetted on the opposite banks with the majestic dramatic scenery of Twizel's Rugged Landscape behind - A site to behold.

Friday night brought our legendary Cavalcade Court into session – so dodgy it probably needs its own lawyer. One by one, the week's mischief-makers were dragged before the bench to answer for crimes ranging from minor misdemeanours to major tomfoolery. To everyone's shock (and probably disappointment), the Giddy-Up girls managed to keep their halos mostly intact this year – a historic first! That's not to say Shona's boys didn't try their absolute hardest to throw us under the wagon wheel.





Parade day, Market Day and Hoedown. The Shetlands kicked things off with flair, leading the Heavy Harness Trail in the parade. With 11 trail's to celebrate everyone had a part to play – from trampers and bikers to horse riders and wagon warriors. The parade snaked through the Host town streets lined with cheering crowds.

Afterward the market commenced with many people enjoying variety of stalls on display. The big Hoedown ended the day – a night of dancing, laughter and tales of mishaps and memories.

What a cracker of a week – one to tuck away in the memory vault, ready to roll out when the grandkids reckon we were boring.





And lastly, a huge shout out to my Dolly – affectionately known as "Dancing Dolly" thanks to her signature jiggy steps. Normally, she's a 5-minute wonder before she's calling it quits and demanding snacks, but not his week! She pranced her way through the entire event like a seasoned show pony with something to prove.

Her sister Lilly? Equally fabulous and just as cheeky. Together these two have dragged me on more escapades I can count – and I probably won't fully recover from either.


